

First Anniversary of Health Care Reform Celebrated as New Benefits for Children and Seniors Go Into Effect



March 30th marked the one-year anniversary of the Affordable Care Act signed into law by President Obama. California has been working with our federal authorities to implement these benefits on a statewide basis. In 2010, provisions of the new law allowed children to remain on their parent's insurance plans up to age 26, mandated the issuance of health insurance for children regardless of pre-existing conditions, and eliminated lifetime and annual caps for medical care coverage.

This year, California's seniors will greatly benefit through a 50% discount on Medicare Part D covered brand-name prescription drugs once they reach the "donut hole" or coverage gap. The coverage gap is expected to shrink over the next ten years so that by the year 2020, the coverage gap will be eliminated. Seniors on Medicare can also receive free preventative health care services in 2011. This includes annual wellness visits, personalized prevention plans, health screenings, vaccinations and counseling. Examples include screenings for blood pressure, diabetes, and cholesterol tests; counseling on such topics as quit smoking, losing weight, eating healthy, treating depression, and reducing alcohol use; and vaccinations for flu and pneumonia.

Additionally, insurance companies will now be required to spend at least 85% of all group plan premiums on the delivery of health care services and health care quality improvement. The new requirement also mandates at least 80% of premiums paid for all individual or small employer health insurance plans to be spent on health care services. Beginning October 1st, seniors will have increasing access to healthcare services at home. The new Community First Choice Option allows states to offer home and community based services to individuals with disabilities through Medicaid rather than institutional care in nursing homes. The Federal government will offer increased assistance for states who offer these community-based services.

Kathy Wat of Pleasanton Named *Woman of the Year*



On March 21st, Assemblymember Mary Hayashi named Kathy Wat of Pleasanton as her *Women of the Year*.

Assemblymember Mary Hayashi presented an official resolution to Ms. Wat on the Assembly Floor for her service as a dedicated community organizer. For more than 20 years, Ms. Wat has volunteered for the California Dental Association. She organized the dental community on behalf of nonprofits *Give Kids a Smile* and *East Bay Stand Down*, where they provided free dental screenings and treatment to children and homeless veterans. She also serves on the philanthropic committee of the Southern Alameda Dental Society, which helps to provide funds for oral health projects.

In addition, Ms. Wat conducts a great deal of work to support public schools and children with disabilities. She serves on the advisory committee for Foothill High School Health & Bioscience Academy, which offers an avenue for students to explore careers in physical and life science. She is also a key fundraiser for Kristi Yamaguchi's *Always Dream Foundation*, developing the *Always Dream Play Park*, which features playground equipment designed to accommodate the challenges of developmentally and physically disabled children and adults.

Ms. Wat is a third generation Japanese American, the sixth of eight children. She is married to Dr. Norman Wat, an oral surgeon, and is the Practice Administrator for his dental office in Fremont, California. They have two sons - Stephen, who is also an oral surgeon and recently joined the family practice, and Randall, who is a first year law student at the University of Hawaii, Richardson School of Law.

Assemblymember Mary Hayashi Named *Legislator of the Year* by the American Red Cross – CA Chapters



Assemblymember Mary Hayashi was named *Legislator of the Year* for 2010 by the California Chapters of the American Red Cross. The award recognizes Assemblymember Mary Hayashi for her “persistent efforts to foster safer conditions for student athletes, and better health care training for their coaches and trainers.”

For the past three years, Assemblymember Mary Hayashi has introduced legislation to address growing concerns about concussions among high school student athletes. Over 40 percent of high school students return to play too early after a head injury, increasing their risk for another concussion and the serious health consequences stemming from such repeated head trauma. This year, she has introduced [AB 25](#), which will establish return-to-play rules for youth who suffer a concussion during a practice or a game at a school facility.



Sports Concussion Town Hall Held During Brain Injury Awareness Month

On March 4th, Assemblymember Mary Hayashi and the National Football League co-hosted a town hall meeting at the Castro Valley Center for the Arts to create awareness about sports related concussions among young athletes and inform her constituents about the importance of Assembly Bill (AB) 25.



While not all head injuries can be prevented, the effects can be mitigated by knowing when it is safe to return to play. AB 25 would require written consent from a health care professional

after a young athlete is suspected of sustaining a concussion or head injury in order to return to play.

The town hall offered the audience an opportunity to learn from the panel of speakers about concussions and the negative impacts an athlete might sustain if left untreated or returned to play prematurely. Presenters for the speaker's panel included: Morris Bradshaw- Former NFL player for the Oakland Raiders, Guy McIntyre – Former NFL Player for the San Francisco 49ers, Dr. Larry Dickinson – Neurosurgeon, Paula Daoutis – Administrative Director for Brain Injury Association of California and Jo Loss – President of the California Parent Teacher Association and Trustee for the Castro Valley Unified School District.

Assemblymember Mary Hayashi Served as Chair and Emcee for Girls Inc.'s 12th Annual Strong, Smart & Bold Luncheon



Assemblymember Mary Hayashi served as the Honorary Chair and Emcee for the 12th Annual Girls Inc.'s *Strong, Smart & Bold Luncheon* on April 1st. The benefit raises funds to help support programs for 6,500 underserved girls in Alameda County.

The *Strong, Smart & Bold Luncheon* is Girls Incorporated of Alameda County's annual awards event. It features an inspirational ceremony to honor three women celebrities and dignitaries, with Bay Area ties, and introduced by rising-star Girls Inc. participants.



This year's honorees included Nicole Taylor, President and CEO of the East Bay Community Foundation; Dr. Laura D'Andrea Tyson, UC Berkeley Haas School of Business Professor and former Chair of the White House Council of Economic Advisors; and U.S. Treasurer and Hayward native, Rosie Rios. Each was honored with the group's signature *Strong, Smart, and Bold Award*. More than 325 people joined the luncheon to listen and learn about the challenges these outstanding leaders overcame to reach their goals and achievements. In addition to the awards, Assemblymember Mary Hayashi and Congressman Pete Stark provided official proclamations acknowledging the honorees' outstanding work in their respective professions.

Assemblymembers Mary Hayashi and Sandré Swanson Introduce HR 10 to Establish Chief Justice Earl Warren Day



Assemblymembers Mary Hayashi and Sandré Swanson introduced and authored House Resolution 10 establishing March 19th as Chief Justice Earl Warren Day in California. Born March 19, 1891 in Los Angeles, Earl Warren was raised and educated in public schools in Bakersfield. He received his Bachelor of Arts and Law degrees from the University of California, Berkeley.

After a brief law practice and service in World War I, he served as an Assemblyman's assistant and clerk to the Assembly Committee on Judiciary. He also served as Deputy City Attorney for the City of Oakland from 1919 to 1920, Deputy District Attorney of Alameda County from 1920 to 1925, and Alameda County District Attorney for 14 years, from 1925 to 1939.

In 1939, he acted as California's Attorney and in 1942 Earl Warren was elected Governor of California, a position he held for three consecutive terms. On September 30, 1953, President Eisenhower nominated Earl Warren to be the 14th Chief Justice of the United States. He resigned as Governor and was sworn into office in the Supreme Court chamber on October 5th.

During his career on the bench, Chief Justice Warren presided over three landmark cases including Brown v. Topeka Board of Education which banned racial segregation of public schools, Reynolds v. Sims which established the "one man-one vote" reapportionment of state legislatures giving equal weight to citizens living in rural and urban areas, and Gideon v. Wainwright which requires low-income individuals charged with a crime to receive publicly-funded counsel as part of their due process.

Assemblymember Mary Hayashi Tours Solyndra Solar Power Manufacturing Plant



With the legislature recently passing [SB 2](#) of the first extraordinary session requiring California's utilities to purchase 33% of its electricity from renewable energy sources by the year 2020, more solar power manufacturing companies like Fremont's Solyndra, Inc. will be producing the equipment needed to supply the energy for California's homes and businesses.

On March 10th, Assemblymember Mary Hayashi toured the Solyndra headquarters in Fremont that manufactures solar photovoltaic (PV) systems and employs more than 1000 workers. Founded in 2005, the company's operation has grown to nearly 800,000 square feet of factory space supplying PV systems to 20 countries worldwide.

Renewable energy (wind, solar, geothermal, and tide) production rates are increasing rapidly as more countries strive to reduce their greenhouse gases that have been shown to cause global warming and changes to the earth's climate.

Clean Water Action Names Assemblymember Mary Hayashi a *Clean Water Champion*



Assemblymember Mary Hayashi was named as a *Clean Water Champion* by Clean Water Action, a national organization working to protect and restore California's water resources, stop pollution, reduce waste, and promote environmental justice. She received an "A" grade on their legislative scorecard for her support of 20 bills crucial to all of California's citizens.

Clean Water Action stated that her leadership is vital to resolving the State's complex and longstanding water and environmental issues. Assemblymember Mary Hayashi is committed to ensuring safe drinking water for the benefit of all Californians.

San Leandro Senior Community Center Opens to Much Fanfare




On April 2nd, hundreds of residents came to celebrate the grand opening of the San Leandro Senior Community Center located at 13909 East 14th Street in San Leandro (adjacent to the San Leandro Hospital). The senior center will offer a wide range of activities, services, resources, and information for adults 50 years of age and older.

Assemblymember Mary Hayashi presented an Assembly Resolution recognizing the historical significance of the grand opening and its placement as the first city owned property to be certified "green." Its features include efforts to maximize sunlight for lighting, conserve water, use recycled materials, and landscape with drought resistant greenery. The new senior center will also serve as the city's new Emergency Operations Center in the event of a large-scale crisis such as an earthquake.

On March 26, 2011, all non-essential lights and equipment were unplugged in support of [World Wildlife Fund's Earth Hour](#). Originating in Sydney, Australia in 2007, Earth Hour asks participants to reduce their energy use for one hour in order to raise awareness about the need to fight global warming and climate change.

Assemblymember Mary Hayashi's district office turned off all non-essential lights and equipment from Friday evening until Tuesday morning as the state celebrated Cesar Chavez Day on Monday, March 28th. The State Capitol in Sacramento partook as well by shutting off the lights at the Capitol for one hour. This year, 134 nations worldwide participated in this extraordinary event.

Katherine Korematsu, Wife of Fred Korematsu, Celebrated Her 90th Birthday



Katherine Korematsu is a name familiar to many because she is the wife of the late Fred Korematsu, a Japanese American citizen who refused to be incarcerated during World War II. He appealed his case all the way to the Supreme Court, which ruled against him in 1944. It took until 1983 for the decision to be overturned. Mr. Korematsu later received the Presidential Medal of Freedom from President Clinton in 1998.

Throughout their lives together, Katherine stood by her husband and supported his activism in the cause of racial justice and civil rights. Together they raised two children, Karen and Ken. In 2009, Karen teamed with the Asian Law Caucus to establish the Fred T. Korematsu Institute for Civil Rights and Education. Since Mr. Korematsu's death in 2005, his wife Katherine carries on his legacy. Last year, the State of California, through a bill co-authored by Assemblymember Mary Hayashi, decreed his birthday, January 30th as Fred Korematsu Day of Civil Liberties and the Constitution Day.

With family and friends, Katherine celebrated her birthday in grand style at Fenton's Creamery in Oakland on March 13th. Assemblymember Mary Hayashi was delighted to honor her with an Assembly Resolution. Happy Birthday!

President Qayoumi of CSU East Bay Heading to San Jose State

Ohlone Community College Trustee Bill McMillin Remembered for His Education and Community Service



It is with great sadness to write about the passing of Bill McMillin, a longtime trustee with the Ohlone Community College Board. Bill was a dedicated and involved member of his community as he served on the Newark School Board from 1994 to 2002 and joined the Ohlone College Board of Trustees in 2002.

Last November he was re-elected to a third term. Bill was instrumental in brokering the acquisition of the land that is now the college's Newark campus. In 2008, he was elected to serve on the California Community College Trustees Board, which advocates for the entire state college system. He was also active in several other local and political groups in an advisory capacity. Assemblymember Mary Hayashi co-authored an Assembly Memorial Resolution to commemorate his long career of service to the education system, and so many other aspects of his community. He will be greatly missed.

State Public Works Board Meeting and Agenda



Assemblymember Mary Hayashi has been appointed to the State Public Works Board (SPWB) as a legislative advisor. The State Public Works Board was created by the Legislature to oversee the fiscal matters associated with construction of projects for state agencies, and to select and acquire real property for state facilities and programs. The SPWB is also the issuer of lease-revenue bonds, which is a form of long term financing that is used to pay for capital projects.

The Legislature appropriates funds for capital outlay projects such as acquiring land, planning and constructing new buildings, expanding or modifying existing buildings, and purchasing equipment related to such construction. Through review and approval processes, the SPWB ensures that capital outlay projects adhere to the Legislature's appropriation intentions.
